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ONE makes groovy safety stirrups that allow horse riders to free themselves and not get dragged to their death.

This ingenious invention is now used by every mounted police officer in New York.

Another had a brainwave to create a website that allowed people to organisc holiday tours in one simple location.

Another was a bunch of plaintiff lawyers and a young married couple who are on a mission to offer unbiased, no-commission, fee-for-service financial planning advice.

#### SmartRider

Its founder Peter Zillmer says his breakaway stirrups will not stop you from falling off the horse, but you won't get dragged and injured.

His clever design was featured on the ABC television program New Inventors last year, showing his unique mechanism to prevent horse-riding dragging accidents.

"The device is almost fool-

proof, able to open either way, and has a footplate that drops out, eliminating the risk of being installed incorrectly by novices or careless riders." he says

be says.
SmartRider, with its factory in Browns Plains in Brisbane's south, has filled orders from mounted police forces around the world including Canada, New York, Czechoslovata, Outensland, Victoria, South Australia and New South Wales, and from the newly formed Australian Federal Mounted Police.

In fact, the federal police have the stirrups but no horses as yet.

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"Our stirrups are so good, they are sold by reputation," says Mr Zillmer, who only took up riding after he got interested in the design of the stirrups.
"It is every rider's fear falling off the horse and being dragged."

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Brisbane-based SmartRider was founded in 2005, and it took Mr Zillner just two years to go from his principal idea to production.
"That was considered very quick," he said.
"And we now make thousands a year and sell them to the US, and have patents pending for Europe – plus we've exported to Japan and Korea.
"I got a hook-up to the New
